

# **Urban Planning in Times of Crisis**

International Workshop at the Bauhaus-University Weimar 6. – 7. December 2013

This conference does not simply want to look at the "impact" of certain budget restrains that have occurred in the last years and which for certain have had negative effects on the capabilities of planning. We are thinking of an understanding of "planning" and "crisis" in a broader and a more profound way. This means that planning cannot be reduced to the activities of a planning office in a city.

As Susan Fainstein once said: there is more planers do than plan and there are more people in a city planning than planers.

In this sense it is related to urban policies and to the wider field of society. "Planning" might be the point where everything comes together and where ideas, principles, power relations and professionalism meets and were translated into a process of space production. We want to have different approaches to planning including different disciplinary and theoretical backgrounds.

The same can be said about "crisis". What the crisis means and what has been called a crisis by the broader public and particular actors in politics and society should be taken as a critical description of the situation. I hope that we share the perspective that what often is called "the" crisis is rooted in deeper changes in our cities and societies, in the challenged understanding of planning as well.

Again, we are not predefine what we mean by crisis, but we hope that the conference enables us to see what the crisis narrative means and what it implies in the different countries and cities.
